

Prescot Museum Helps *The*Watchfactory Celebrate its Heritage

Prescot Museum has been working with Knowsley Housing Trust, First Ark and the architects of *The Watchfactory*, the new housing development in the converted former Lancashire Watch Company factory building in Prescot.

The architects and interior designers were keen to reflect the historical importance of the listed building and so we were asked to help create displays in the foyer which celebrate the site's rich heritage.

The Lancashire Watch Company sought to revitalise the horology industry in Prescot. Thousands of men and unmarried women worked for the company making a wide range of watches and clocks. Due to over-diversification and associated tooling costs, the company ceased trading in 1910 after producing almost a million watches.



During the First World War, the building was used as the barracks for the 17th Battalion, King's (Liverpool) Regiment, known as 'the Pals'. Men were assigned to a battalion when they volunteered to enlist, but as huge numbers were needed, it was thought that men would be more likely to

sign up to fight alongside their friends and relatives. Lord Derby raised "a battalion of pals, a battalion in which friends from the same office will fight shoulder to shoulder for the honour of Britain and the credit of Liverpool." Four 'Pals' battalions of local men were formed within a week.

In the 1920s, printing firm C. Tinling & Co. moved into the building and extended it to accommodate presses and binding machinery. The company produced books, pamphlets and newspapers: the Liverpool Evening Press.

In the 1970s, the building was split into separate industrial units to accommodate smaller businesses, and became known as Prescot Trade Centre.

The building and grounds have now been rejuvenated to create a beautiful new housing development. Images of the local area over the last century are spread throughout the complex, decorating the corridors and inspiring the residents.

The Liverpool & Knowsley Book Art Exhibition: Frankenstein 2018 Kirkby Gallery 17 September - 26 January

To mark 200 years since the first edition of Mary Shelley's *Frankenstein; or, The Modern Prometheus* was published, this exhibition has been organised in partnership between Liverpool Book Art, Liverpool Central Library and Kirkby Gallery.

Frankenstein is a classic work, arguably the very first work of science fiction, it is also a core text of Gothic literature. Its themes of ambition and hubris, ethics and morality, responsibility for the consequence of one's actions, free will and empathy have been important since the book was first published; in the modern age of genetic manipulation and artificial intelligence it remains relevant.

Book artists from around the world have responded to *Frankenstein* with a hugely creative range of ideas stimulated by the themes, the way in which the story is told and even made links to other classic tales; some of the works have been made in small editions and some are unique works. Many of them are available to buy.

The exhibition at Kirkby Gallery is an enlarged version of the display that debuted at Liverpool Central Library, with new pieces responding to the theme, as well as displays of items from Prescot Museum's collection complementing the artists' books.



New *From Pen to Paper* Creative Writing Workshops
